BACKGROUND

Ryley has been working on a Train Whistle Cessation Plan since 2012. It is widely accepted that train companies do NOT want to stop train whistles and have plenty of tactics to avoid it. There is a safety nexus to the issue; however, there is also a procedure established and approved by Transport Canada for the steps and standards to be met for a train whistle to stop.

The Village of Ryley diligently went through the steps, complied with all requirements, made application, and continues to work through the process. To highlight the delay tactics used by CN, the timeline on this most recent stage provides insight on how CN operates. That said, we are getting closer:

- a. April 2020: Although we were under the impression that work was being conducted throughout 2019, CN informed Ryley in April 2020 that they will be providing an estimate of costs for the work required to adjust the crossings so they can stop the whistle.
- b. July 2020: CN delivered a cost estimate for \$136K (see attached). This cost estimate does not provide much information about what work needs to be done. Ryley asked for a detailed break-down of three separate invoices, one for each crossing. CN asked for Ryley to decide soonest as the cost would be greater during winter.
- c. December 2020: Videoconference to discuss and understand the work required. Provided for this meeting were two new invoices totaling \$85K (attached).

SITUATION

Although the work required is the same, Administration asked CN if they might consider a "silent zone" - stopping the whistle during the night only. Being that CN is motivated to keep whistling, Ryley is asking if CN might reduce/cover some of the \$85K if Ryley conceded to daytime whistling only.

Meanwhile, now that we understand the technical aspects of the work somewhat better, Administration is carrying out the following activities:

- a. Reviewing the Act, Regulations and Orders to confirm the necessity of the requirements that CN is proposing.
- b. Confirming with Transport Canada and the Transportation Safety Board that Ryley is responsible for these costs and CN is not.
- c. Investigating if there is any of this work that can be carried out by our contractors or our staff at a better price.

RECOMMENDED ACTION

That Council for the Village of Ryley directs Administration to pay the remaining 2020 invoiced balance from Beaver Emergency Services Commission (BESC) with the expectation that a 2020 reconciliation for actual costs will result in an adjustment to the 2021 first quarter (Q1) cost sharing invoice and as result of the same recommendation made by the Beaver Regional Partnership (BRP).

AND

That Council for the Village of Ryley directs Administration to inform Beaver Emergency Services Commission (BESC) in writing of the detailed concerns that Ryley has about the Ryley Fire Department Level of Service.

BACKGROUND/PROPOSAL

All five partner municipalities held back cost-sharing payments from BESC in 2020, or in the case of Beaver County, warned the Commission that the agreement needs to be respected or payments could be held back. To date, all other partners have now paid their 2020 invoices, and Ryley has not paid Q2 to Q4.

Administration recommends that we pay our invoiced amounts for 2020 Q2 to Q4; although these are based on the BESC 2020 budget forecast and not actual reconciled costs, recent work through the Beaver Regional Partnership (BRP) indicates that these budgetary concerns will be remedied in 2021 with a new Shared Services Agreement (SSA)and follow-on replacement plans by BESC for Capital, Business and Level of Service. Noteworthy, all other partners have paid on the understanding that an adjustment will be made by BESC on the 2021 Q1 invoice to compensate for the operational deficit difference between budget and actual costs for 2020. It is generally accepted by all other partners to leave the past in the past, for over-charges on operational deficits since 2014.

Pursuant to the SSA, BESC produced the six (6) year Apparatus Replacement Plan (2017-2022) as a component of their Business Plan issued in 2017. Missing from the SSA prescription is a "Long-Term Capital Plan". All five partner municipalities have been lenient with the Commission over these last few years. A Long-Term Capital Plan (20 to 30 years) considers and sets the over-arching financial requirements in consideration of amortization. It informs the possibility, probability, and reality of what annual costs for capital and capability can and should be, including the reality of what assets and capabilities really cost. In the end, a Long-Term Capital Plan sets the conditions and limitations for a Business Plan (3-5 years). Major variance is a symptom of a business plan that is not informed by a Long-Term Capital Plan. Without such, there can be significant confusion and a lack of understanding for priorities when decisions need to be made that are not pursuant to the original business plan and thus create variances.

OPERATING CONTRIBUTION. Rather than being invoiced on actual costs (audited/reconciled) which were much lower throughout the years of 2014 to 2019, the cost-sharing contribution was invoiced by BESC on the <u>budget</u> amount for these years and the cost-sharing was never reconciled for any of these years. This resulted in municipal operating contributions being far in excess of the prescription of the SSA.

CAPITAL CONTRIBUTION. The BESC 2017 Apparatus Replacement Plan called for a contribution of \$445K each year from 2018 to 2022. It laid out a plan to manage 22 vehicles plus other apparatus. In variance from the Business Plan, BESC invoiced \$485K rather than \$445K for 2020. While it is conceivable that this additional \$40K is a reasonable and actual need, there has been no adjustment to the Business Plan and there remains to be no Long-Term Capital Plan in place. Further, as seen in the attachment, a review of the progress on the Business Plan for the past four of the six years for the plan, 2017 to 2020, shows a considerable variance from the Business Plan with little understanding or justification for such. Of the fifteen (15) events that were planned over these four (4) years, only three (3) occurred as planned:

- a. E41: Tofield Pumper11 was transferred to Bruce in 2019.
- b. P41: Bruce Pumper was divested in 2019 (upon transfer of Tofield P11), and
- c. B65: Tofield Brush17 was transferred to Kinsella in 2018.

The remaining twelve (12) planned events resulted in variances from the plan:

- a. Over-expenditures of \$299K on three (3) new purchases
 - i. \$238K on two (2) purchases for Tofield (2018-B17, 2019-R11), and
 - ii. \$61K on one (1) purchase for Viking (2019-T56).
- b. Divestment losses of \$665K (records do not appear to show sales revenue)
- c. Failure to purchase \$1,172K in new apparatus. Failing to purchase pursuant to a plan causes later purchases to cost more, maintenance costs on older equipment to be higher and timely divestment revenue to be lost.
- d. Unplanned capability growth. Although it might appear prudent to "hang-on" to a replaced vehicle, the net effect is that the capability maintenance budget is spread over additional unplanned assets that would otherwise have gained a forecasted revenue.

LEVEL OF SERVICE. Additional to the Operating Cost-Sharing, Capital Plan and Business Plan concerns is the BESC "Level of Service" Plan, the resulting impact to Ryley and the effectual "execution" of fire services in the local area. BESC has determined that the Ryley Fire Department (RyFD) is to be maintained at Level Two. This places Ryley at a lower priority for apparatus replacement and it defines the RyFD as a supporting department that cannot respond to calls except in support of other Fire Departments. Given the proximity of the RyFD to Clean Harbors, Claystone Waste Management and Equity Industrial Park, this does not make sense. A reasonable assessment of capability requirements for the RyFD must indicate that RyFD should be a Level 3 Station. Further, without the capability to respond alone, the homes in the Village of Ryley are at the mercy of a 10 to 15-minute distance from Holden or Tofield for respond to fire calls. The citizens of Ryley are certainly not going to be accepting that Council spend public money for a partnership that would reduce their safety.

Regardless of this discussion on the Level of Service at which the RyFD should be set, it is apparent that the dispatch center in Strathcona County does not understand or comply to the BESC Plan for Level of Service. Recently, a fire at the Nutrien AG Solutions plant in Ryley spurred a call to RyFD by the dispatch center at Strathcona. RyFD successfully responded and extinguished the fire by the time Holden and Tofield arrived. However, according to the BESC Level of Service Plan, RyFD was not technically authorized to act in this call and was expected to wait for Tofield or Holden to call on Ryley to support them if necessary. It is noteworthy that this is not the exception; this is the normal practice every time a call is made from the Ryley area and there are numerous examples of this disconnect occurring. RyFD is not going to sit by idly and let a building burn down.

COST / SOURCE OF FUNDING

The Village of Ryley has a planned annual contribution around \$70K based on the Ryley portion of the total partner share.

BACKGROUND / PROPOSAL:

- 1. Beaver County Victim Services is a non-profit organization put in place by the Alberta Solicitor General Department. This volunteer organization is currently one of the committees that Ryley participates in by way of Council representation. Its role is to assist victims of crime in coping with the effects of crime, education of crime prevention techniques, liaison between victims and police and courts, public awareness and more.
- 2. The organization operates under grants and donations from third parties.
- 3. We have a standing motion:
 - "2019-11-19 #9: MOVED by Cr. Ducherer that Council for the Village of Ryley directs administration to place in the budget process a standing budget line of \$2 per capita yearly to support Beaver County Victim Services organization as per the funding request.

 CARRIED"
- 4. Due to COVID-19 these non-profit organizations have not been able to hold fundraisers as per usual. Administration recommends that The Village of Ryley contribute an additional \$1000.00.
- 5. We have previously contributed to Beaver County Victim Services in 2020 for their golf tournament as per the following motion:

"2020-06-16 #9: MOVED by Cr. Ducherer that Council for the Village of Ryley donates \$300 to the Beaver County Victim Services Golf Tournament. **Seconded** by Cr. Kowalski **CARRIED"**

COSTS / SOURCE OF FUNDING:

We anticipated an expenditure of \$966 under GL 2-11-981, Donations to Community Groups. The additional \$1000 was not anticipated. As we are at year-end and there remains a balance of \$2970 available in this GL for 2020, donating \$1966 would leave this GL to close the 2020 budget at a surplus of \$1004

Re: Recommendation for Replacement Board Member

At the December 14, 2020 meeting of the Board of Directors of Claystone Waste Ltd., the Board accepted the resignation of Jay Nagendran. Mr. Nagendran resigned on the basis of his assessment of a potential conflict of interest between his role on the Board and his role as CEO and Registrar of APEGA.

Pursuant to Claystone's Mandate and Roles Document, s. 1.7.9, it is the role of the Board of Directors to recommend to the Municipalities a replacement Board member in accordance with the competency matrix in place at that time. Directive 3 created by the Municipally Controlled Corporation Steering Committee for the Claystone Waste Limited Partnership created the competency matrix for this purpose.

Mr. Bridgeman recently retired after 25 years with EPCOR, with his most recent position being Senior Vice-President Water Canada. He holds an ICD.D designation and a Ph.D. in Economics. His competency attributes includes operational leadership, strong board governance knowledge and experience, accounting, finance and risk management. The Board believes that Mr. Bridgeman would be an excellent addition to our Board and we therefore write this letter to formally recommend him for approval to the Board, replacing Mr. Nagendran's two year term.



As required by the governing documents, we provide the attached Competency Matrix, completed for each existing board member and the candidate, for your review. We also attach Mr. Bridgeman's candidate profile prepared by the Vogel Group, which includes his resume.
